Acclaimed Author Pete Hamill and "The Big Read" At Temple Sinai



Renowned author and journalist Pete Hamill will visit Temple Sinai at 7:30 pm, Thursday, December 5 to discuss his bestselling novel, *Snow in August*. Set in working-class Brooklyn in 1947, *Snow in August* explores the relationship between Rabbi Judah Hirsch, a refugee from Prague, and II-year-old Michael Devlin, an Irish-Catholic youngster. These endearing characters set the tone for a memorable, *New York Times* bestselling work of literature.

Pete Hamill is a novelist, essayist and journalist whose career has spanned more than 40 years. The author of nine novels, two short story collections, and movie and television scripts, Hamill distinguished himself starting in the 1960s as a journalist. He has been a columnist for *The New York Post, the New York Daily News, New York*

Newsday, The Village Voice, New York magazine and Esquire.

Born in Brooklyn in 1935, Hamill is the oldest of seven children from an Irish immigrant family. He attended Catholic schools as a child, and left school at 16 to work in the Brooklyn Navy Yard. He then went on to serve in the U.S. Navy, where he finished his high school education. Later, he attended Mexico City College, studying painting and writing, and later went to Pratt Institute. As a journalist, he covered wars around the world, including those in Vietnam, Nicaragua, Lebanon and Northern Ireland. For his newspapers, he has covered everything from murders to the great domestic disturbances of the 1960s. He witnessed the events of September 11, 2001, and wrote about them for the New York Daily News.

An original Saturday Night Live writer who the New York Times says has "earned a place in the pantheon of American pop culture," Alan Zweibel has won multiple Emmy, Writers Guild of America, and TV Critics awards for his work in television which also includes It's Garry Shandling's Show, Monk, PBS's Great Performances, and Curb Your Enthusiasm.

A frequent guest on talk shows such as *The Late Show with David Letterman*, Alan's many theatrical contributions include the Tony Award winning play 700 Sundays which he collaborated on with Billy Crystal, Martin Short's Broadway hit Fame Becomes Me, and the off-Broadway play Bunny Bunny – Gilda Radner: A Sort of Romantic Comedy which he adapted from his best-selling book.

Alan has written the 2006 Thurber Prize winning novel *The Other Shulman*, the popular children's book *Our Tree Named Steve*, and a collection of short stories and essays titled *Clothing Optional*. His humor has also appeared in such diverse publications as *Esquire*, *The Atlantic Monthly*, *The New York Times Op-Ed page*, *The Huffington Post and MAD Magazine*.

The co-writer of the screenplays for the films *Dragnet, North*, and *The Story of Us*, Alan recently received an honorary PhD. from the State University of New York and in 2010 the Writers Guild of America gave him a Lifetime Achievement Award. Alan is currently working with Billy Crystal on the feature film version of 700 Sundays, executive producing a documentary mini-series with Steve Carell and David Steinberg and writing a novel titled *Offside* with Dave Barry. And on the TV screen he will be appearing as a new character in the upcoming season of *Curb Your Enthusiasm* and in a short film for *Funny or Die*.

But the production that Alan is most proud of is the family he's co-produced with his wife Robin, their children Adam, Lindsay and Sari, and their grandchildren Zachary and Alexis.

Temple Sinai Long Time Congregant Julius Eisenstein Shares Survivor Story at Kristallnacht Service Friday, November 8 at 6:30 pm

When Temple Sinai long time member Julius Eisenstein enrolled his children in religious school in the 1950s, World War II and his youth in Poland and in Nazi concentration camps were not far behind. He kept his memories to himself until many years later, but now relates his Holocaust survival story

to adults and school children in New York and Florida.

Born in Tomaszow, Poland, Eisenstein was one of five children. Julius, his brother and his future wife survived several camps, including Auschwitz and Dachau, where American troops liberated him. A photographer captured that moment, and 40 years later, Julius was reunited with the U.S. soldier who was in the photo with him.

During the 6:30 pm Friday night, November 8 service commemorating Kristallnacht, Eisenstein will recount his story of survival, and his ultimately joyful embrace of life in America. Julius is an articulate speaker whose recall of detail is crystal-clear. His compelling testimony is important for all to hear firsthand.

The Separation of Church and State: A Temple Sinai Connection Thursday, February 6 at 7:30 pm

One of the major doctrines of American freedom and the First Amendment, the separation of church and state, has history through Steven Engel, a late Temple Sinai member. His son, Jonathan Engel, will speak about a landmark 1962 United States Supreme Court Case on this topic, *Engel v. Vitale*, otherwise known as "the school prayer case," at 7:30 pm Thursday, February 6 (snow date February 27).

Jonathan Engel, an attorney with expertise in American history and constitutional law, will review the historical background of American religious practices, the legal particulars of the Engel v. Vitale case, which originated in the Herricks School District, and consequences of the lawsuit to the community and to the families it involved.



A discussion of Jewish genetic history will be the topic for an evening with author and Albert Einstein School of Medicine professor Dr. Harry Ostrer at 7:30 pm onThursday, November 14.

In his book, Legacy, Dr. Ostrer blends history, science and biography to offer readers a fresh perspective on the Jewish people around the world, and their history. He will explore the quintessential question of who Jews are: a race, a people, a religious group. Ostrer also will discuss a related project that he devised, the "lewish Hap Map Project," which focuses on creating a database of Jewish genomes.



Dr. Ostrer's book presents a cutting-edge portrait of population genetics, a field that may soon take its place as a pillar of group identity.



Scott Kaufman is a cognitive psychologist interested in the development of intelligence, creativity and personality. Dr. Kaufman is a professor of Psychology at New York University, he is co-founder of The Creativity Post and writes the blog Beautiful Minds for Scientific American Mind. "It has been a very long, winding, and emotional journey for me to get to this point. As a child, I was labeled with an auditory learning disability, which left me always feeling one step behind my peers. While I soon outgrew my earlier difficulties and was both ready and eager for more intellectual challenges, I remained in special education. Trusting the experts, I retreated further and further into my own rich fan-

tasy world, which only confirmed everyone's expectations. It wasn't until 9th grade, when a teacher took me aside and questioned my place in this world, that I gained the courage necessary to become the author of my own life story."
